







Additional Sound Protection

Additional sound protection is being built as part of the Mandurah Estuary Bridge Duplication project.

Additional walls are being included on all four quadrants of the project: the north-eastern (Waterside Drive) and south-eastern (Waterlily Drive), north-western (Leisure Way) and south-western (Seahawk Drive) quadrants of the bridge.

The extended walls will protect privacy and provide additional noise buffering for residents on either side of the Mandurah Estuary Bridge to just east of Old Coast Road and just west of Leslie Street.

"While the original design was compliant with State Planning Policy 5.4, the feedback from the community indicated that further protection was required," Project Director Andrew Ives said.

"We thank everyone who has been involved in the discussions that have led to this outcome."

The Mandurah Estuary Bridge Duplication Project is jointly funded by the Australian and Western Australian Governments.

Further vegetation clearing will be required to accommodate the wall extension. The project is exploring opportunities to minimise the clearing footprint.

The new walls will match the original noise wall design which will feature artwork by local WA artists. Urban design elements previously shown to the public will be included in the additional wall design.

Community pop-up

The next step will be to provide an opportunity for the community to see up-to-date project plans and artwork concepts.

A community pop-up session is taking place at Halls Head Central shopping centre on Thursday 21 November, from 1pm-5pm.

Jointly funded by the Australian and Western Australian Governments, the \$148.8 million Mandurah Estuary Bridge Duplication project is delivering a second, two-lane bridge on the south side of the existing structure to provide additional traffic lanes.

A new four-metre-wide shared footpath will also be built to help the local community better access recreational activities. An accessible fishing platform will also be provided on the eastern foreshore.
