









EastLink WA is a culmination of more than 40 years of road planning activities to provide a safer, more efficient route between Perth and Northam for freight and road users. It will allow users to travel at a consistent speed through bridged intersections and a dual carriageway, deliver major travel time savings, and enable access for RAV 7 heavy vehicles (36.5m combinations) between Perth and Northam.

The project is currently in the Planning and Development phase, which will take place over three years and involve planning studies, design refinement and scoping to produce preliminary designs for the route. This detailed planning and development work is needed to establish a business case and inform future investment decisions.

Planning for highway access

The topic of future access has been frequently raised in our discussions with the community on the project. There has been previous work undertaken regarding access and connectivity to the highway which we have reviewed and refined. We have also been working with the City of Swan, Shire of Mundaring and Shire of Northam to determine the most suitable access points and connections.

The Perth Adelaide National Highway (PANH) is being planned as a control of access highway. This means access points will be strategically located, with no direct driveway access, to allow safe and efficient through movement.

From Roe Highway to Gidgegannup, PANH will be designed to freeway standard, which will include 'freeway style' interchanges with entry and exit ramps onto the highway.

The PANH from Gidgegannup to Northam will be designed as a rural highway with several interchanges and intersections that provide left-in-left-out access or movement in each direction.

Have your say on proposed access locations

From our conversations with the community at drop-in sessions and landowner meetings, we have gained a better appreciation of important connections and how locals use the road network. On our My Say Transport page, we have developed an interactive map which shows the proposed locations of each access point and the entry and exit movement along the highway.

Explore the map and tell us what we've got right and what might need further consideration as we refine the Access Strategy for the project. The opportunity to provide feedback through the map will close on Monday 28 February 2022.

Future connectivity

The Access Strategy will also consider local road connectivity, provision of new service roads, proposed cul-de-sacs and access and egress for bushfire prone areas.

In April, we will provide another opportunity through our interactive map, to present these aspects of the Strategy and provide more information on the types of interchanges and intersections connecting the highway.
