





Mandurah Estuary Bridge Duplication Project



What's happening?

We are planning for construction of a new bridge to be located on the south side of the existing Mandurah Estuary Bridge, to enhance safety for road users and reduce congestion.

The duplication project will see a second, two-lane bridge constructed over the Estuary, which will have capacity to go to three lanes in future, when traffic demands require it, further helping to reduce congestion and travel times.

This \$110 million project is co-funded by the Australian (\$55 million) and Western Australian (\$55 million) governments.

Project Update

On 14 July 2022, Premier Mark McGowan and Minister for Transport, Hon Rita Saffioti, announced Expressions of Interest had been called for a design and construction contract for the Mandurah Estuary Bridge Duplication.

Engagement is continuing with key stakeholders including the City of Mandurah, its Access and Inclusion Advisory Group, Fishability Mandurah, Traditional Owners and the Peel Harvey Catchment Council, to understand project requirements around environment and future maintenance.

Noise assessments and environmental approvals are progressing, and an early concept design for the bridge and new universally accessible fishing platform has been developed for industry to use as a guide when developing their project proposals.

Geotechnical site investigations, both on water and land will be completed in early September and Main Roads is progressing heritage assessments, project scoping and stakeholder consultation.

Project features

In addition to the new bridge, we are planning for a new, universally accessible fishing platform to make fishing more accessible to people of all ages and abilities.

Access for riders and walkers will also be improved, with construction of a new shared path on the southern underside of the deck of the new bridge.

Have your say

We are seeking your comments on project elements including the universally accessible fishing platform, visual and noise amenity, landscaping, urban design considerations and path connectivity. The comments received will be considered by the project team in the next phase of the project.








